BETTER THAN HANDEL!

A CONCERT OF MUSIC FROM EVINGTON'S OWN COMPOSER

This was the opinion of many Evington parishioners who attended the Trio Sonatas of Evington's amateur composer, James Sherard (1666 - 1738) on 31st March 2019.

The Chamber music was played by Amalia Young and Hannah Teasdale (Violins) Audrey Riley (Cello) and Bryan Evans (Keyboard). It was the first time in 300 years that some of this music was played and heard. Chris Hossack had, through the Bodleian Library, traced an original manuscript back to an archive in Swindon. It was amazing to be in St. Denys Church hearing this music for the first time and thinking that the composer, who probably did know Handel personally, was probably buried only feet away in the chancel of the church.

This was a well-researched and well executed performance that must surely be one of the most exciting highlights of St. Denys Church's 800 Anniversary Celebration.

JAMES SHERARD - EVINGTON'S COMPOSER

James Sherard was born in Bushby, studied as an anothecary in Chelsea Physic Garden and then started his own business. He must have been writing music at this time because we know he came in contact with the 2nd Duke of Bedford and dedicated his first set of trio sonatas to the Duke. When the Duke died in 1711, Sherard's interest in music also died and he turned to botany. In 1720, on retiring, he had an ample fortune and bought two manors in Leicestershire, Evington being one of them. Reputedly Evington Manor had been lost in a game of cards or dice. James Sherard mostly lived in Eltham Palace and from there he made trips to continental Europe in search of seeds for his garden, which became recognised as one of the finest in England. I like to think that James Sherard also brought plants and trees to Evington and improved the manor there, but there is no evidence. He had no children and left his fortune to his five nieces. He was buried in Evington Parish Church and there is a large marble monument inscribed in Latin to his memory on the South wall of the chancel.



50 YEARS OF TWINNING BETWEEN LEICESTER AND KREFELD



On Monday 5th May, a delegation from Leicester's twinning city of Krefeld, Germany travelled via Birmingham Airport to Judgemeadow Community College. They came on this prestigious occasion to celebrate 50 years of this twinning partnership.

The delegation was led by the Mayor of Krefeld (Oberburgermeister) Frank Meyer, with Eckart Preen, Managing Director of the Business Development Agency, and six other members of staff. At Judgemeadow they were welcomed by the City of Leicester European Twinning Association (CLETA) Executive committee and staff and students at the College.

The Mayor of Krefeld said, "In the past we have had a bad history of conflict between Britain and Germany with two world wars and, following this, it has been a wonder that our generation has been able to live in freedom and peace. But peace doesn't come without working at it. We work at it because we also want the next generation to do the same.

Simply put, 'Friends don't shoot their friends' "

Rita D'Silva Griffiths replied saying how important this friendship was between two cities . She said she was not sure what Brexit holds for us, which might give the wrong impression.

Both cities get a lot out of the relationship and face to face exchanges, sharing business, policing, student exchanges and youth community work. John Townsend from the CLETA Executive committee explained how cultural and academic links are only a short step away from involving the Chamber of Commerce and other business delegations. He also spoke about the police exchanges and described a soap box race that had taken place in Krefeld with police cadets.

The delegation left Judgemeadow after lunch and were going to visit King Power Stadium and the Richard III exhibition. The visit at Judgemeadow ended with an exchange of presents and good wishes.

BHAVIK PARMAR'S PASSIONS



In Feb/March 2015 edition of the Evington Echo, a profile article about Bhavik Parmar, a local resident, explained that his passion for Theatre was a driving force in his career choice, which at the time was difficult under family pressures. Not long after, at the end of his University course, Bhavik was appointed as an Education Officer for Birmingham Repertory Theatre.

Four years on, I met Bhavik again to find that



he has moved even closer to his childhood dreams and passions, which were firmly rooted in his desire to facilitate children and adults express themselves through Drama.

Bhavik is now a Senior Education Officer at Birmingham Repertory as well as running his own small business called 'Panorama Drama'. This business can facilitate children's parties, youth theatre and schools' workshops with a difference. The difference is that they are all bespoke and tailor-made. There are interactive games, immersive storytelling, shadow performing and arts and crafts. No two parties are ever the same because they all develop from active participation based on personally chosen themes. STOUGHTON FARM PARK AND GARTREE ROAD PLANNING APPLICATION

An outline planning application (O&WBC 18/001178/OUT) has been received from Oadby and Wigston Borough Council for the demolition of two semi-detached houses located at Stoughton Grange (near the Cow and Plough) and land opposite Stoughton Grange, which is to the South of Gartree Road. The proposal is to build 20 dwellings on 4.72 acres of land at Stoughton Grange and 290 dwellings on 34.14 acres of land on the South side of Gartree Road, which is the main site. The Cow and Plough pub will be left as it is. The development on the main site will include affordable homes with areas of landscaping and public open space, new access from Stoughton Road and Gartree Road and pedestrian and cycle links.

The 90-year old plan for an Eastern District Distributor Road (EDDR) linking the A6 at Oadby to Gartree Road and then up through Evington to the A47, were first drawn up in the 1930s. This issue has been thrown back into focus with the Co-op outlined plans for some 310 homes. If the EDDR was built it would form the last 'missing link' of Leicester's outer ring road. On the framework plan for these 310 dwellings, land is safeguarded for a future Link Road.

While more homes are needed, this plan is criticised by Highway Officers of Leicestershire County Council because of the traffic implications for Shady Lane, which exceeds its capacity now and Shady Lane is not a classified road. Therefore discussions still need to be held to mitigate the impact of the proposals on the local highway network and particularly the Shady Lane junction.

STOUGHTON GRANGE AND LAND FORMERLY OWNED BY THE POWYS KECK FAMILY



Stoughton Grange, formerly the home of the Powys-Keck family. It started as an Elizabethan Mansion, was extended over the years, and fell into disrepair and was pulled down in 1926

Until it was put up for sale in 1913, most of Evington Village belonged to the Powys-Keck family who lived in the big house called Stoughton Grange, which was on land Evington people called Stoughton Farm Park or 'The Farm Park'.

Stoughton Grange remained unsold and was eventually pulled down in 1926.

Besides the 466 acres which included Evington, the Powys-Keck family owned an area of land of more than ten square miles, and mostly all grassland. This land was offered for sale separately from the House in 1913 and the only prospective buyer for the land was the Cooperative Wholesale Society, Manchester, who wanted it for dairy farming, but since this was a sporting estate, the owners withdrew it from the sale.

In 1919, the Co-op made another offer and this time it was accepted. The Co-op land started

from the left-hand side of Shady Lane and was divided into 12 farms of about 500 acres each. About half of it was used for dairy farming the milk being sent to a depot in Uttoxeter and the other half for arable farming consisting mostly of winter wheat, winter barley and oilseed rape. The whole estate used to be managed from an office in Stoughton village and was Leicestershire's largest farming enterprise. A separate Stoughton office also housed the headquarters of all the Cooperative Wholesale Society's farms throughout England and Scotland. It was then the biggest farming concern in Great Britain!

The farm at Stoughton was developed as a Farm Park, but sadly closed down in 2001 after a dreadful outbreak of Foot and Mouth disease across the UK.

In 2006-7, The Co-operative Society published hugely unpopular plans for a 15,000-home eco-town scheme called Pennbury on land in the Stoughton area. This plan was dropped in 2009 after a two-and-a-half year local campaign against the development.

In 2014, 4,700 acres of land were purchased by the Wellcome Trust (the second highest spending charity in the UK) and this included Oadby Lodge Farm Estate of 3,860 acres. The land was bought as an investment and is used for arable, fruit and veg. crops. The Co-op retained 300 acres, including Stoughton Farm Park.

The dairy farming has now stopped and there are empty farm buildings. Recently many horses have grazed land on the corner of Shady Lane. There is now a planning application for 310 dwellings, including affordable houses. (See article on left.)

ST DENYS 800TH EVENTS CONTINUE



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PEOPLE VS GOVERNMENT - CLIMATE CHANGE PROTESTS



Evington residents were amongst thousands of climate change protesters who recently brought London to a standstill.

Thousands of supporters of the international, apolitical network 'Extinction Rebellion' swamped the capital's streets, campaigning against the lack of government action on climate change, forcing the Government to pay attention to the environmental crisis and finally act to stem the threat of mass extinctions and rising sea levels due to 'global warming'.

An Evington environmental activist, who was among many protesters from Leicester, told me:

"People have had enough of being ignored. So many people, from all walks of life, have come to show that they are determined to do something to stop mankind from destroying the Earth, and it's about time that the Government faced up to the fact that it actually needs to do something about it! All sorts of people were there – not just your stereotypical activists. There were pensioners and whole families with young children there – all concerned with the legacy and state of the world that the next generation will inherit."

Extinction Rebellion and the protesters had three specific demands for the Government:

- 1 to 'Tell The Truth' to declare that there IS a climate emergency.
- 2 to 'Act Now' to halt biodiversity loss and reduce greenhouse gas emissions to achieve a 'carbon neutral' status by 2025.
- 3 'Beyond Politics' to set up and be led by the decisions of a 'Citizens' Assembly' – made up of ordinary people - to discuss carbon neutral solutions and ecological and climate justice.

"It was a well-coordinated, polite and peaceful protest, despite the sheer number of people involved. Extinction Rebellion have strict rules. To take direct action, but with no violence, no alcohol and no swearing; it was that peaceful that some people blocking the road were playing chess! They kept people informed about how they could protest without the risk of being arrested — sitting in the middle of the road, blocking the traffic was illegal, camping out on the grass outside Parliament for a week with banners was not. Some people chose to help out other protesters with their wellbeing; others were handing out suncream on that unusually hot day."

But, illegal or not, people did sit in the middle of the road. Supporters from the East Midlands joined others blocking Parliament Square and Westminster Bridge focusing on the 'People's Assemblies' theme – on the first day at least there were very few arrests – there were simply far too many people camped out in the road for the police to do anything!

Oxford Circus was blocked by thousands of people addressing 'telling the truth' about climate change – the centrepiece of the protest being a pink boat in the middle of the road – if global warming is not tackled, rising water levels will submerge many major cities by 2050 and Central London would be underwater.

There were many high-profile speakers including the actress Emma Thompson and Greta Thunberg – an inspirational 16-year-old girl from

Sweden who started the climate strike rebellion in schools. She stated, "We are standing at a crossroads – you are all here today because you have decided which way to go."

More people were eventually arrested after blocking London's major arteries for a whole week, as well as those who allegedly took more radical measures of supergluing themselves to a train and the headquarters of Shell UK — which shows the strength of feeling about these issues.

'People power' on this scale seems to have had an effect – on May 1st Parliament declared a state of 'Climate Emergency' - let's hope something is actually done to tackle this problem. Our local protester said, "We have approximately 11 years to make a difference - before it's too late to undo the massive damage that mankind has done to the planet in just 100 years. Ways we can achieve this are to stop burning fossil fuels and make the change to sustainable, clean energy: wind, wave, solar and hydroelectric. Walk or cycle more and drive less. We also need to make changes to our diet; meat and dairy production use so much more energy and land than (healthier) plant-based alternatives."

We need to work together to make that change before it's too late. If enough 'little people' are committed to work together, they can have a big voice and make a big difference. We need to make sure that the world we pass on to our children and grandchildren is one worth living in. Addy Tyler

Jo's talk was titled.

"What might exist below the platform of Piggy's Hollow?" Jo gave some historical facts and speculated on the different possibilities for the site

Piggy's Hollow hasn't been investigated except for a small trench in the 1970s that found lots of slate, which may indicate a manor house, a keeper's lodge, a hunting lodge or even something else. Jo explained that Piggy's Hollow was built before the fashion for fortified houses where moats were a status symbol.

The site in the 13th and 14th Century was a deer park with fishponds and moats inside. Why were they there? She compared Piggy's Hollow with Bradgate Park where a gatekeeper's lodge had been excavated. Jo said it was bizarre that somewhere so obvious as Piggy's Hollow had not been excavated before.

The planned geophysical survey in May had the following three probes: 1) Resistivity 2) Magnetometry and 3) Ground Penetrating Radar.

Resistivity is where an electric current measures the time to receivers. If the object is dry and solid there's lots of resistance. If it is wet and not solid there is little resistance. Magnetometry is where a magnet senses the polarity in the ground and compares it with the polarity of the Earth.

Ground Penetrating Radar (GRR) is where the radar in the ground sends back a picture. Jo made a promise to Historic England that there will be no intrusive work done on the main site. Watch this space, because we hope the next issue will bring you interpretations of this survey. Helen Pettman




The anthology sold out within 3 weeks and many very positive feedbacks have been received from readers.

Some days when Kally is in a really good mood, not that often, she will put me on the seat next to hers. I feel so proud on those days and like to be treated in a more respectful manner.


