




THE EVINGTON FETE AND SHOW THIS YEAR

CURING ANXIETY AND DEPRESSION

I can't help feeling this morning that so much energy being put into trying to cure people of anxiety and depression is misplaced when those feelings are a very natural reaction to a world that is completely bonkers, riven with inequality, led by people with distorted or absent morals and when as a species (or certainly those of us brought up in capitalist, patriarchal culture), we are ecocidal and that basically means suicidal.

Our detachment from nature and the source of life is driving us all mad to different degrees. I have no faith in mental health services, social services, hospitals or any other form that tries to cure people of the pain of being alive at this time of turbulence. Not that I don't admire and respect the individuals that work incredibly hard and do their utmost within those structures to help others - I do. I think the world is full of amazing people doing their best and often achieving incredible and beautiful things. I don't have any great answers but I feel that my only path is to plant seeds, be as kind as I can to as many people as I can and ask for help when I need it - because one of the saddest thing about depression is feeling unworthy of help. I relish people asking me for help too because it's actually a real gift when I feel that there is something I can do.

As an autistic person, I am not always very good at that stuff that people do - I agonise over very simple acts of giving and receiving because I am never sure what is appropriate but more and more, I am coming to realise that simple gestures and kind words are incredibly powerful. Lots of people have told me to look after myself in the weeks ahead - so I'm taking that advice - talking to friends, taking things slowly and hopefully sitting in the garden listening to the bees. For me, that is the best protection of my own sanity in a crazy world.

DISPLAYS ALONG DOWNING DRIVE

CHERRY TREES MUST COME DOWN ON DOWNING DRIVE

In the picture above, you may be able to see the trunks of the cherry trees in the distance.

This is to let you know that these three cherry trees all have a notice on them saying they will be felled because they are diseased.

A local resident asked for a second opinion, which was granted. But 'Trees and Woodlands' at Leicester City Council have confirmed to the Evington Echo that the trees are suffering from a fungus disease called Phellinus Pomaceus and are at risk of falling down in high winds. They are about 50 years old, which is old for cherries.

Three more cherry trees will replace the old ones with another round the corner. There will be a variety of species, but all with blossom and good for bees. Also three more trees will be planted elsewhere.

THE CITIES OF KREFELD AND LEICESTER



The article in the June/July edition of the Evington Echo about the connection between the two cities was very interesting. However, the connection between them goes back more than 50 years.

In April 1957 the former City Boys Grammar School took their annual school play to Krefeld and performed it several times in a theatre in Krefeld and in a nearby town. The play was 'King Henry the 4th (part two)' by William Shakespeare. There were reports and pictures in the Leicester Mercury and Leicester Evening Mail on 3rd and 4th of April 1957 about the play and the visit to be made in the Easter holiday to Krefeld.


There were also reports and pictures in the 'Krefelder Stadtpost' on Thursday, 18 April and Saturday, 20 April 1957. (I still have the original articles from the German newspaper.)

We stayed with the families of students who attended the school and the visit lasted nearly 2 weeks (from memory!!).

This visit started a connection with Krefeld which was continued by the school for a number of years. I know that many of us who were there in 1957 always maintained that this later connection with Krefeld and Leicester city began with the visit in April 1957.

A TALK ABOUT URBAN BUZZ IN LEICESTER BY MICK FATON



(This talk on 27th August 2019 at the Wycliffe United Reformed Church was by Mick Eaton, Horticultural Adviser to Leicester City Council. It was hosted by Graceworks and organised by Friends of Evington Park.)

THE START

Nick Packham from Buzz-life visited Leicester last year and has now left to continue to deliver the project in other UK cities. Nick Packham writes:

"The project will bring together the city council, the Nature Improvement Area (NIA) and local community groups. The city has already come a long way in its journey to improve the local open spaces and parks so that the public can gain more enjoyment from them, and Urban Buzz will bring an exciting new twist to this with the creation of lots more pollinator habitat, colour and life in key areas across the city. Leicester has a wealth of parks and open spaces dotted throughout the city with ample opportunity to create amazing pollinator rich habitats creating corridors for bees, wasps, hoverflies, beetles, flies and butterflies to keep Leicester buzzing."

THE PROJECT

Mike explained that over a millennium wildflowers have developed in partnership with bees and other pollinators, but that with loss of habitat due to housing, highways and other amenities, we now need to think of all the different ways we can help, including what we can do in our private gardens, parks, verges and other land.

Just leaving everything to nature is not the way forward because then the aggressive plants take over and we are left with a monoculture.





Mick went on to explain the different projects that have started along Goodwood Road, Palmerstne Way, Aylestone, Belgrave Gardens, Abbey Park and Glenhills Boulevard and the new habitats that have been created. He gave a vision of the future with different grasses and plants sown in our verges and explained that 97.7° of plants that are attractive to pollinators are now used in parks.

ADDFNDUM

Buglife (The Invertebrate Conservation Trust) initially identified eight cities in the UK for the Urban Buzz project, which was funded by Biffa Award, National Lottery Heritage Fund, People's Postcode Lottery and Garfield Western Foundation. The eight cities were: Birmingham, Bristol, Leeds, Ipswich, York, Leicester, Plymouth and Cardiff. But Buglife has smashed these targets and they are now working in many other areas in the UK as well.

About Urban Buzz Leicester, Buglife writes:

"Thanks to the enthusiasm and hard work of 561 volunteers and dedicated partners, 112 Buzzing Hotspots were enhanced for pollinators and wildflowers, bug-friendly garden plants, flowering shrubs, nesting habitats and a host of other work. Urban Buzz worked in high profile locations such as Abbey Park, Victoria Park and Castle Hill Country Park and with partners including Leicester City Council, the University of Leicester, Naturespot and the network of committed 'Friends of' groups – all working together to bring colour and wildlife back to our parks and open spaces.

Buglife was also pleased to announce that the joint winners of the Best Buzzing Hotspots for Leicester were the University of Leicester for the efforts of their staff and volunteers across their campuses. The runner up was awarded to Leicester City Council's Paul Barker and Mick Eaton for their work on Glenhills Boulevard.

YOUNG PEOPLE CARE ABOUT THEIR ENVIRONMENT AND THE PLANET

Most 16 year-olds are responsible for perhaps a smashed phone screen, spending too much money or having an untidy room. But Greta Thunberg isn't your average 16 year-old - she has become responsible for the biggest international youth protest movement in history, in conjunction with millions of passionate young people. We are fit to burst with a deep, growling frustration that our voices are not being heard because we "don't really understand what we're saying". But all we're saying is a way of drawing public attention to the facts, to enable widespread, international, united reform to the way our society functions. All we're doing is presenting the aforementioned facts to adults who should have understood them better decades ago and taken the action required. Greta wants teenagers to take responsibility for their planet alongside her, by striking and ensure the main culprits face pressure to 'tidy up' the home they're gradually destroying. We are, day by day, strike by strike, changing the rhetoric that young people couldn't care less about the stuff that goes on beyond their own, comfortable bubble of a life.

The global school-strikes for climate have been a huge success, with 24th May being the largest ever youth demonstration as students across the world refused to go to school. It's become a fantastic platform for expressing the fury that has been fuelled by a distinct lack of climate action during a time period where such action is critical. Climate Strike Leicester is one such 'branch' of the UK movement, Youth Strike 4 Climate, which I've contributed to since March this year. We aim to raise awareness of the catastrophe that is the climate emergency, each month in central Leicester, by challenging our local community, MPs and industries and collectively putting pressure on the UK government to aim for and achieve net-zero carbon emissions by implementing the Green New Deal. This aims



to bring about transformative change to British economy by investing in more sustainable infrastructure, technology, jobs, etc. Smallscale change, protest and petitions have failed thus far, and the youth are rising up to say enough is enough. Except this time, we can't fail because the present and future of our planet is at stake. We can't fail because we all know how horrific the impact is on those around the world and nature as a whole, will continue to be and the damning scientific conclusions if nothing continues to be done. We can't fail because everything we do in the next eighteen months will change the course of the climate emergency and its effects, for better or for worse.

Particularly in Leicester, we've been trying to bring the attention of strikers and the general public to the impact the climate emergency has already begun to have now on those in the global south. Although we recognise that many environmental campaigners are conscious of how corporate and individual choices can have a cataclysmic effect on entire communities or areas of wildlife in the future, many don't seem to recognise that the effect has already kicked in. The unnatural forces that have worn down and shaped this postmodern age of economic profit over people has led to a world in which the suffering of those less privileged is accepted as normal. This has got to change. We strike so government aims to tackle the climate crisis doesn't only factor in the selfish western world, but those who suffer the painful impact right now, each day.

Drastic change is imperative and should be implemented: the youth have now been pushing for change.

Please get involved in the movement as much as you possibly can (donate, strike, encourage your unions to do the same, share the message online, cut your own/business' carbon footprint), defending creation from humanity's reckless nature. Let's bring about some change.

TWO REMEMBRANCE EVENTS AT THE EVINGTON WAR MEMORIAL



American Troops Remembered 75 years on

On 13th August 1944 in St Denys Church, Evington, a special service took place at which the US 82nd Airborne Division 504th Parachute Infantry Regiment presented the local community with their own 'stars and stripes'. The American battle flag still hangs at the back of the church today in memory of the friendship that was formed during the summer of 1944 when the paratroopers were camped on Shady Lane.

Almost 75 years to the day a ceremony took place as part of the Evington Village Fete and Show on Saturday 10th August 2019. Based on the service reported in the Leicester Evening Mail in 1944, local re-enactors marched from the Village Green to the church where they were welcomed by a large congregation, including Mr Michael Dally who had been singing in the choir at the original service.

Deputy Lord Mayor, Councillor Deepak Bajaj offered warm greetings and Mr Ian Hurst presented an American flag just as Colonel Reuben Tucker had done 75 years before. Soprano and singing teacher Ms Margaret Rice sang a beautiful American spiritual and the Vicar, Rev'd Anthony Lees-Smith, shared the inspiring story of US army chaplain, Captain Delbert Kuehl, who went from Evington to Holland, accompanying the troops on Operation Market Garden.

One of the re-enactors said, "It was an honour and a privilege to take part in today's service to remember the sacrifices these soldiers made for us all."

"This felt like such an important moment in our community's history that it was right to mark it in some way during the church's 800th year," said Rev'd Anthony Lees-Smith. "My hope and prayer is that we who represent

ONE ROOF SHELTER NEEDS YOU...

One Roof Leicester has been supporting people who are homeless in the city for the past four years by providing accommodation, mentoring and advice. To date, the charity's many volunteers have operated a night shelter for three months during the winter period, offering ten beds a night for the homeless.

Now, thanks to a National Lottery boost of almost £190,000 announced in May 2019, on 30th September, One Roof Leicester will open 'One Roof Shelter' as a permanent, all year-round service.

Betty Clarke, Project Manager at One Roof Leicester, said: "We will be launching an 8-week pilot of the static shelter on 30th September from Central Baptist Church, Leicester and in December will start the rotating night shelter from faith venues for 3 months as we have done in previous years. As well as offering free accommodation, we will be providing advice to people on claiming benefits and applying for housing – upskilling them so they can reach their full potential. This includes local homeless individuals, destitute refugees, refused asylum seekers and EU migrants."

To make the shelter a success we need the support and help of volunteers and we are urgently looking to increase our already substantial volunteer base.

We have a range of volunteering opportunities which range from a few hours in the evening to overnight. We offer all our volunteers training, including Safeguarding, Health and Safety and Wellbeing. Volunteers work in groups and there is no lone working.

Here are some wise words I read about handling rejection and bouncing back from a New York journalist:


- (a) Think persistence not perfection
