Editorial

Evington in Bloom results

It is with great pleasure that I write to thank all the volunteers from the 'It's Your Neighbourhood' groups and all the other many volunteers who have helped Evington in Bloom get a GOLD award from East Midlands in Bloom/the Royal Horticultural Society.

The judges' special award went to a young person, Grace Davidson, for the Jubilee bed in the St. Denys Church grounds. Jeff and Suzanne Henry won a Silver Gilt award for their residential front garden. The Cedars won a Silver Award in the pub competition. Our two school entries were from Mayflower Academy Judgemeadow Community College. Mayflower was judged the best fruit and vegetable garden in the East Midlands; Judgemeadow came a close second with others.

In the Evington in Bloom report the judges gave separate marks for horticultural achievement (we got 31 marks) environmental work (we got 27 marks) and community work (we got 29 marks) with a total of 87° 6

Leicester City Council are putting on a special event for Bloom and IYN (It's Your Neighbourhood) on 7th October. We have five IYNs in Evington and there are 22 in the City.

In Evington, the Friends of Evington and the Vintage Cafe have sponsored a discussion meeting about IYN groups. Discussion has been about Climate Change issues and how this particular branding, supported by the Royal Horticultural Society, could help bring people and environmental work together. We have called this a Village Meeting and plan to have more Village Meetings. We are making podcasts and have been helped with the technology side by Rob Watson from Decentered Media and Leicester Stories.

A Civic Statement by the Editorial Team of the Evington Echo

It is the duty of all Leicester citizens to refrain from aggression and hostility and to uphold the law. Violence against the police force is never acceptable. They are public servants who seek to protect us and to promote order in our city. Keep the peace and help the police by passing on any information which might help to prevent a crime. Sites for housing development in Evington

Some 7 sites in Evington and North Evington have been earmarked for developments, including some green open spaces. The developments are all outlined in a city masterplan mapping out housing, employment and more, for the next 15 years. The full list has been published in the Leicester Mercury and we have extracted the information relevant to Evington and North Evington with thanks to the Leicester Mercury.

Evington Valley Road, former Dunlop Works (Spinney Hills) - the former factory site could be transformed into a 45 home project with some of the site used for employment.

Land North of Gartree Road, Evington. Another green space which could see 30 homes constructed.

Spence Street (North Evington) 19 homes could be created on this street.

Land adjacent to Evington Leisure Centre, Evington. 13 homes are suggested for this green space.

QUEEN'S PUDDING

Serves 4

Half a pint of milk, 2 eggs separated, 2oz castor sugar, 1 lemon, rind only, 2 tablespoons of jam, knob of butter or half an oz, 2oz of breadcrumbs or cake crumbs.

Heat the milk until warm, grate the rind of lemon. Mix breadcrumbs with lemon rind, butter and egg yolks. Pour milk over breadcrumb mixture, leave to stand for 20 minutes. Cook (Gas 4 180oC) in a 1-pint pie dish for 25 minutes. Whisk egg whites until firm, whisk in 1oz of sugar and fold in 1oz of sugar. Carefully remove pudding from oven and spread with jam, cover with meringue. Turn oven down (Gas 2, 150oC) Cook for 30-40 minutes until the meringue is golden-tipped.

This was an appropriate venue because the DMU is the International Hub for Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 16 for Peace, Justice and Strong institutions.

The speakers at this conference discussed the complexities of the word 'Peace' which isn't just an absence of war or fighting, but also a state of mind. COS partners explained how they have worked in prisons to understand and empathise with an individual's situation and help them turn their lives around through Peace education training.

This conference also reflected on the Net Zero targets as we face challenges brought about through climate change. It also discussed the assets of the National Health Service (NHS) and more people locally enjoying life. One suggestion was to help with the Canal and Riverside Trust! There was more sharing of personal stories from local people, local politicians, and community and business groups. "We have threat multipliers that destabilise Peace, we need the opposite, Peace multipliers to build a more stable environment". "Peace in the World starts with Peace in Yourself" "Let's all learn from each other", "We need to develop road maps to get there", "There are lots of local initiatives – let's find a way to 'join the dots".



TWO EID PRAYERS IN DAVENPORT PLAYING FIELDS



As a part of the Islamic tradition, to mark the end of Ramadhan, the Eid Al-Fitr prayer took place in an open field – the Davenport Road Playing Fields – on Monday 2nd May 2022, corresponding to the 1st Shawwal 1443, of the Islamic Calendar.

Masjid Mu'adh ibn Jabal, the local Goodwood Mosque, organised the special prayer outdoors, which is a practice that has been ongoing since the time of the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him). At least a thousand attendees were present, that included men, women and children, to witness the first outdoor Eid prayer within the locality. This Eid is the first of two in the Islamic Calendar, which is celebrated to conclude the accomplishment of fasting in Ramadhan, resulting in one attaining closeness to the Almighty.

I joined a group of around fifty volunteers with my dad, as we helped steward the event efficiently, due to a cricket event taking place later that morning. Not only did the event run smoothly, the sunny weather also aided everyone who attended. The proceedings entailed a lecture, delivered by our local Imam, Mufti Asim Patel, followed by the congregational Eid prayer.

Just over two months later, on Saturday 9th July, the Eid Al-Adha prayer also took place in the same location. This date corresponded to the 10th Dhul Hijjah 1443 of the Islamic Calendar. I was yet again given the chance to volunteer in a similar way to the former Eid, and another Imam of Masjid Mu'adh ibn Jabal, Maulana Muhammad Patel delivered the sermon. The congregation was reminded of the importance of the second of the two Eids in the Islamic Calendar: to commemorate the sacrifices made by the Prophet Ibrahim (Abraham), and his son Ismail (Ishmael), may the Almighty's peace be upon both of them.

Both were very successful events, and we hope that the Eid prayers next year will share a similar outcome.

Leicester Stories

At a Community media zoom drop-in, the topic was 'the need to decarbonise our society and economy and how it could be facilitated through different community media outlets'. We talked about encouraging conversations to bring about change within our neighbourhoods. We agreed that to reconnect with nature we need to be able to tell our own stories in the same way that gardening groups need to be able to make their own plans together and then action them.

Opportunities for dialogue are needed and then we need to share our discussions through community media and not leave them in the room.

The IYN (It's Your Neighbourhood) scheme is a remodelled way of bringing people together through gardening and is a scheme that has been supported by Friends of Evington/ Evington in Bloom since 2012. This year there are 5 IYN groups in Evington and there is a LCC coordinator for volunteers as well.

We have been holding discussions in Evington called Moot meetings to explore the IYN concepts and other topics. The inspiration and recording was done by Rob Watson from Decentered Media, but the meetings were self run.



THE NEW INTEGRATED CARE **BOARD FOR THE NHS** LEICESTERSHIRE, LEICESTER AND **RUTLAND**

Early in September, I attended a Primary Health Care Meeting at Leicestershire County Cricket Club on Grace Road, Leicester. I was there to learn about the changes to our NHS with this new board and their vision for managing Primary Care.

We were introduced to about 20 professionals working on the Board and given the opportunity to ask the Board what they are doing about the backlog for operations, why it takes so long to get through to our GPs on the telephone, why people without English as their first language are disadvantaged, how the clinical model is changing and many more questions.

This new 2-month old Integrated Care Board, explained how they are working hard to make a real difference to the lives of the people and communities they serve despite the context of the looming cost of living crisis, more health inequalities and the fear that greater numbers of people will be driven into poverty.

They will work to take partners on board with them and set up a system where people feel empowered to raise their concerns and have them answered. The two main speakers were the Chief executive, Andy Williams and the Chief Operating GP, Neal Sangani. They said that probably only 1 in 20 people who contact their local service really need to Repeat prescriptions, see a GP. management of long-term conditions, etc. could be seen by a widening range of health professionals. It's about being able to organise so that people can see the right person in the right place at the right time. It's about plotting out the new pathways.

They spoke about rolling out System 1. With the NHS app. 75° 6 to 85° 6 of people can get smartphone access and of the 134 GP practices in Leicestershire, Leicester and Rutland, most are now developing their Patient Participation groups to be able to support each practice and communicate with the community.

The new Integrated Care Board has already started to set up:

* The expansion of crisis cafes offering drop-in support for people struggling with their mental health.

(www.leicsprt.nhs.uk/service/crisis-cafes)

- *Tackling health inequalities in cancer screening - what is the reasons behind poor uptake of cancer screening in some parts of the community? (www.nhs.uk/conditions/nhs-screening)
- * Virtual wards, so people stay in their own homes. It is hoped these wards will

be set up and running by the end of this year. The plan is for around 120 staff to work across 14 virtual wards.

- * Supporting young victims of violent crime: The Violence Intervention Project (VIP) will have a team of support workers based in Leicester Royal Infirmary's Emergency Department to work with young victims to identify the support they might need. (This project is administered by the charity 'Turning Point'.)
- * Artificial intelligence speeding up skin cancer diagnosis: There are 3 sites in Hinckley, Melton and Leicester City all outside a major hospital setting.
- * Supporting refugees to explore their hidden talents. The team was launched in April and working to establish links in the local community and raise awareness of the career pathways available to them Those without the 'right to work' status can be helped through work experience to support their journey into future paid employment. A package of support including English language skills is developing.
- * Project Launch Fund Scheme: Money raising to help finance a wide range of improvement schemes and tackle health inequalities.



Her first job was in the office of a hosiery company as an administrator. There she met her husband Francis Reece, who happened to own the company, so now they would run the firm together. Francis and Joyce enjoyed travelling all over the

world. They also enjoyed hiking and rock climbing with friends in Wales. The had one daughter, Heidi.

Sadly in 1967, Joyce and Francis divorced, so Joyce took up another position in the office of a hosiery distribution factory in Leicester. Joyce moved around and lived in numerous places around Leicestershire, making lots of friends. These friends would become good travelling companions for all her holidays.

Then Joyce left the hosiery factory and took a position with Leicester County Council in social services as an administrator. This would be Joyce's last job before retirement. On her retirement Joyce wasn't the type to just sit around; she had many volunteering jobs mainly being an assistant in charity shops, in particular in animal charities because of her love of animals. Joyce was also a volunteer driver for the Red Cross, taking elderly people to appointments and shopping. With her passion for travel, she also become a volunteer agent for Saga Travel. In between her voluntary work, Jovce would spend lots of time with her sister going out for meals and holidays together with their two beloved dogs.

After moving around many places in Leicestershire, Joyce acquired a flat in Evington Village in High Street, which would be her last place to live. She would say "of all the big houses and places I have lived, this is my favourite".

Joyce was a very sociable person. She loved to go out around the village shopping and chatting to people. She was also a frequent visitor to The Cedars pub,

where she would be seen often having a meal and drink with a group of friends. Joyce was very much an outdoor person spending hours in the garden just sitting or gardening. She really looked forward to the annual Village Fete and Show. She would always enter one of the competitions, winning one year the best garden border outside her flat.

She also loved entertaining - the more the merrier. So during and after the Fete and Show, Joyce would put on a spread of sandwiches, cakes and drinks in the little communal garden where she lived, inviting friends and anyone she would meet at the Fete. So people would trot off from the Village Green over to the garden and would be greeted by Joyce in her own distinctive voice "Hello Ducks".

A new hospital to ease operation backlog

Casablanca Café 186 Uppingham Road LE5 OQG (An advertorial article)



The Evington Echo welcomes Sanae and Ali, the new proprietors and managers of Casablanca Café at 186 Uppingham Road. I had a convivial chat with Sanae over a steaming cup of Moroccan mint tea served, in the traditional way, from a silver teapot placed on a little silver tray. "An essential part of Moroccan hospitality is to honour and receive guests and to serve them with grace", she explained. I was certainly made to feel most welcome and, as I sought to know more about the business, Sanae's friendliness soon indicated that I had an enthusiastic interlocutor. This would be a smooth interview I thought.

Our conversation flowed like warm honey as Sanae informed me that the café in its present form and location had been open since July 2022. Previously Sanae made patisserie to sell in their other concern, a Middle Eastern grocery store, which is just across the road from Casablanca. Both husband and wife have connections with France and Italy and they are both multilingual, speaking French, Arabic,

Italian and of course English.

"Our café has a very multicultural ambience because of the international clientele. For example, in one day I can speak to people from India, Pakistan, France, Italy and from the Maghreb and the wider Middle East. We are popular too with English folk and our menu caters for several tastes – from the traditional English breakfast to authentic Moroccan meals."

As well as serving the local area around Uppingham Rd they have visitors from Evington, Syston, Leicestershire and even from the West Midlands. It has become part of a social ritual to travel in specially to meet friends and to sample authentic Moroccan and English food in a convivial ambiance. If you visit alone and you want some company staff and customers are happy to strike up a conversation with you. If you prefer some quiet downtime here, that's fine too.



The best-selling item on the extensive menu is the ubiquitous Moroccan mint tea. It is the first thing offered to guests in the Moroccan home. The tagine is a slow-cooked meat or vegetarian stew. It also refers to the terracotta

cooking vessel that the tagine is baked in. Every Jumma (the Muslim holy day of prayer on Fridays) Moroccan families cook couscous as it's a great dish for sharing with invited and unexpected guests who may visit after the Friday sermon (or

khutbah.) Couscous is a Maghrebi dish of steamed granules of rolled durum wheat that is often served with a stew spooned on top.

The Lavazza coffee, which originates from Milan, is made from a delicious blend of Arabica and Robusta coffee beans. It is very popular with everyone and Casablanca has regular orders from staff working in the local businesses on Uppingham Road.

They have some regular informal groups who use the cafe as a social meeting place. They are planning coffee mornings and tagine cuisine demonstrations where all ingredients will be provided. The aim is for participants to prepare and cook an authentic tagine which they can take home. They can even return home with the actual tagine cooking vessel as a souvenir of the experience.

If you would like a quieter time at Casablanca Sanae recommends you visit at 9.00am or at 3.00pm. If you enjoy the hubbub reminiscent of a souq, then come at lunch time. The opening times are Tuesday to Saturday 8.00am to 6.00pm and Sunday 9.00am to 5.00pm.

Age UK been supporting the people of Leicester, Leicestershire & Rutland for 70 years, but it has also grown to be the largest independent charity supporting older people in England. The demand for services has grown exponentially

Beginnings

After the Second World War it was clear that changes to the Poor Law were needed. In 1971 The National Old People's Welfare Committee became independent of government funding and local groups took on the charity name of Age Concern or Help the Aged.

In 1984 the first Help the Aged shop opened selling second hand goods. In the 2000s - Age Concern groups came together to work as a federation. . The local Age Concern / Help the Aged groups remained independent and autonomous. In April 2009 - Age Concern England and Help the Aged joined forces to create a new charity dedicated to improving later life for everyone and a year later, in April 2010, the merged charity was rebranded as Age UK.

Lockdown

As lockdown began the charity set up a 7-day a week helpline and food bank.s. The amazing work of their dedicated staff and volunteers meant that 18,000

telephone calls were made, 750 food parcels were hand delivered and over 3,000 prescriptions collected during the pandemic.

There are over 20 different volunteer roles including befrienders visiting the ill and housebound, charity shop assistants, minibus drivers, helpers in Day Care centres, support for carers, helping at memory cafes for people living with dementia, and, during COVID, emergency support volunteers and telephone befrienders, to name a few.

During lockdown the demand was challenging when older people reported feelings of deep loneliness, isolation and low mood. Some felt suicidal.

Warm and Wise is a 70th birthday



initiative to provide affordable warmth information, advice, and support to Leicestershire residents over the age of 50+.
