The first editor of the Evington Echo

As you see from the front cover, Angela Stephenson, the first Editor of the Evington Echo, returned to Evington and visited the exhibition.

She explained how the Evington Echo started when a community tutor and a librarian decided Evington could do with a local newspaper and circulated a few green leaflets to call a meeting. A few residents turned up to the meeting in Evington library, but no community tutor or librarian! Despite a dwindling group and lack of any experience, the first issue was published in June 1981 and has continued ever since.

Big Help out

Evington House - A Public Place

A team of people, including Baljit Singh, Rob Watson, Harkesh Farma, Val Fisher and myself initiated a meeting to discuss the future community use of Evington House and to retain the house as a public asset.

Baljit spoke about Capital and Revenue costs. Capital costs include the overheads: building, heating, lighting and maintenance costs. Revenue costs are about the day to day running of the centre.where we can apply for grants.

Baljit said that if we run it with volunteers, then our revenue cost is £0, but he would recommend applying for grants and/or business sponsors to pay 3 people to support the activities from 8.00am to 3.00pm and 3.00pm to 10.00pm with a third overlap person. Estimated cost £30,000 a year.

Everyone made contributions at the meeting and the outcome was to progress the matter directly with the City Council at the earliest opportunity, with Friends of Evington having oversight of the proposals.



Nitrous Oxide & Balloons – A Warning!

You may be used to seeing little shiny silver canisters in the gutter - these are nitrous oxide canisters. This is the new 'drug of choice' for many young people.



Increasingly, we are also coming across larger cylinders (about 30cm long, shaped like a balloon pump), which are highly canisters, pressurised obviously containing much larger quantities of nitrous oxide (NO2) - intended to be used in the food industry. Often found in parks, on grass verges and down small back streets and quiet cul-de-sacs, they are frequently accompanied by several latex balloons. Inhalation directly from the canisters is highly dangerous so it is used to inflate balloons and then inhaled from them. It is also known on the street as 'balloons', 'hippy crack', 'chargers', 'Nos', 'Noz' and 'whippits'. After cannabis, nitrous oxide (also referred to as 'laughing gas') is thought to be the most commonly used drug amongst 16-24-year-old in England.

When inhaled, nitrous oxide causes shortlived feelings of euphoria, relaxation and fits of giggles (hence its nickname); in other words, a quick 'high'. However, it can also cause sound distortions and hallucinations, anxiety and paranoia, severe headaches, dizziness and can stop people thinking straight. It slows your brain and your body's responses. Heavy, regular use can cause a deficiency of vitamin B12 leading to serious nerve damage, numbness in the fingers and toes, pain and difficulty walking, spinal injuries and even paralysis. It can also stop the formation of white blood cells, leaving the body unable to fight infection. Inhaling too much nitrous oxide can cause unconsciousness, suffocation from a lack of oxygen, even death. According to the Office of National Statistics, the inhalation of nitrous oxide has been listed on at least 45 death certificates since 2010. Consuming alcohol alongside increases the risks from both and it can become addictive. Like all drugs, it affects some people much more than others.

Although the gas has legitimated uses in the food industry and medical uses (mixed with oxygen as 'gas and air' for use in labour or dentistry) it is strictly regulated and monitored in use and dosages. In the park, in the dark and under peer pressure it is much harder to regulate and to remain safe. Under The Psychoactive Substances Act 2016, it is illegal to sell or give away nitrous oxide for recreational use, with a penalty of 7 years imprisonment, a hefty fine, or both.

Stay alert within your local community; be aware for signs of this anti-social behaviour. Closer to home, by spotting canisters, balloons and unusual bodily symptoms you may prevent potential illness and grief within your families.

Digital Audio Broadcasting (DAB)

Leicester Digital Partnership was awarded the Small Scale Digital Audio Broadcasting (SSDAB) licence for Leicester as part of Ofcom's third licensing round. Its social gain objectives are to 'carry out media production and distribution services that will benefit communities in Leicester and Leicestershire'.

Dr. Rob Watson (Evington Echo trustee) is the Managing Director of Leicester Digital Partnership, the not-for-profit CIC responsible for the new DAB multiplex. The first batch of stations to be available on DAB are Kohinoor Radio, Community Radio 1, Nishan Radio, Panj Pani, Radio 2 Funky, Radio Seerah and Ramadan Radio Live

DAB digital radio offers advantages over traditional analogue systems because of better quality of sound, more channels and more choice as digital platforms provide more space. Also it's easier to find channels when they are set, as with TV channels.

Radio Seerah

Now a DAB radio and full time since 2019, Radio Seerah is dedicated to sharing the meaning of the Islamic faith to people in Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland.

It broadcasts on 1575 AM/MW and aims to bring a better sense of understanding,

trust and belonging in our 'super-diverse city'.

LEICESTER ENVIRONMENTAL **VOLUNTEERS (LEV)**

have been busy in the Evington Ward this year, with a particular focus on the Evington Arboretum, Shady Lane.

In January, LEV members braved the cold and frost to wade into the pond and they hand pulled out one third of the vegetation, such as bullrushes, sedges and willowherb. As always, we are careful to leave this by the side of the pond for a few days to allow any creatures to climb back into the pond.

They also created a habitat pile out of deadwood, so that the wildlife could shelter from the elements during the winter. We were especially thrilled to spot a Green Woodpecker in the woods nearby!

During February, our attention turned to the trees. A large area of mature poplar trees were being overcrowded by smaller, self-set saplings. Volunteers worked hard to clear a patch of overgrown, Poplar selfsets. This really opened up the area, ensuring the large, mature trees have the space to continue to thrive.

Volunteers also cleared a very overgrown patch of willow and crown lifted the trees to let in more light, promote the health of the trees, and open up sightlines to allow visitors to enjoy this beautiful gem of a park.



A hub for biodiversity in Sedgebrook Open Space

Letting Nature do her own thing on a small green patch (it's a bit over 1ha, does that qualify as small?) opposite the local Co-op on Downing Drive is the conscious decision of a group of local volunteers. Jeff Henry, a retired physics teacher living next to Sedgebrook Road, is leading this Community Garden Project. Turning Sedgebrook Open Space into a biodiverse and attractive space including a wildflower meadow and a circular mowed running and walking pathi. This local It's Your Neighbourhood group have been working hard since the summer 2021, after a campaign led by locals to save the area from being partly turned into space for houses.

A group of around 15 people have planted plants, bulbs and seeds, such as penstemons, cow parsley and hellebores. These plants that grow well are chosen because they are sustainable, pollinator friendly and mostly native.

Providing new opportunities for wildlife is this IYN's goal. It meets the objectives described in the Leicester city local plan, according to the publication draft which can be found on the website consultations.leicester.gov.uk.

The project has been funded from a £10 000 pound Community Lottery grant given to the charity, Friends of Evington.

As walkers stroll on the 500m grass pathway mowed by the volunteers, they

come across walls of twigs, old leaves and other cuttings. Behind what looks like mere rubble is a well thought structure. The gardeners (and somewhat improvised builders) have used plant residues to create 'deadhedges', lodges for local



fauna.

Sedgebrook Open space is to be a welcoming hub for wildlife, but also for the local community. It's another much appreciated breather from the bustling city. In addition to the flowers and herbs, a picnic bench is to be installed, making the land even more pleasant. It is a project supported by the Council and long awaited by the community. The Council has been asked when the picnic bench installation will be delivered. Brown, Leicester City Council's volunteer coordinator for IYNs and Bloom tells us this will be done as soon as the ground is firm enough to take a lorry and installation equipment.

Anyone interested in helping out in this community garden project is welcome. No particular skills are required, just motivation and interest in gardening, as well as availability on Thursday mornings. Please contact Jeff Henry email: contact@littlegreenshoots.uk or telephone 07854525820.



Traffic fumes you can't abide? Please consider Park and Stride.

It is well established that pollutants in engine emissions can lead to and aggravate respiratory diseases, such as asthma. Motor vehicle pollution also contributes to the formation of acid rain. The pollution emits greenhouse gases that cause climate change.

It is heartening therefore to know that Whitehall Primary School continues its campaign to reduce traffic congestion at the school gates. The primary motive is to safeguard children and to reduce hazards and inconvenience for parents, drivers, pedestrians and residents in the immediate vicinity. The school has taken on the challenge to affect behavioural change by encouraging more children and their families to walk to school.

In partnership with Living Streets and Leicester City Council, children are already being recognised and rewarded for making changes which promote daily exercise and help to reduce traffic congestion near the school.

This said, it is acknowledged that not all children are able to walk the whole way to school for a range of reasons: the distance involved and time pressure on parents. Whitehall has therefore set up a Park and

Stride scheme.

Park and Stride enables parents and carers to park their car within a 10-minute walk away from the school. They can stride the rest of the way with their children.

Harris, aged 4 in a reception class, is a young enthusiast and advocate of the scheme. He told the Echo: "My Mum used to drive to school but now she parks further away and I walk to school. I like getting the badges."



The Coleman Centre (LE5 4JZ), near the maternity unit General Hospital, has agreed to trial a Park and Stride site on their car park. It is initially for up to 20 families of children at Whitehall Primary School. Families received a permit to authorise parking from Monday to Friday during school term time only.






Thanks to this very generous grant we now have a whole set of new skylights and new lighting in the Sports Hall which will help to keep all the sporting activities dry and safe for many years to come.

Not long after the new roof was completed on the main section of the club building, one of the skylights in the adjacent Sports Hall was broken, possibly by a stray ball. All attempts to repair the skylight failed and then another skylight began to leak. To make matters worse, one of the Sports Hall lights was hit by another ball, creating a huge problem for its replacement. As a result of all these

difficulties, activities in the Sports Hall had to be limited, especially on wet and snowy days.

Thanks to the grant from the National Lottery Community Fund, EYC has been able to replace all the skylights and upgrade all the lighting to LED, with the result that the Sports Hall is once again able to provide the whole range of its sporting activities in a dry and safe environment.

We are particularly grateful to Wigston Roofing Ltd for the excellent work that they have done, including their research to find the best possible skylights to suit our purpose. The new skylights are double-skinned and 200 times stronger than glass so don't need a security grid to protect them from stray balls! We are also very grateful to Kneller and Kneller for the superb new LED lights that they have installed.

More good news about funding!

Evington Youth Club are incredibly grateful to the Co-op Community Fund for a grant of £2,000 and to Sport England (via Active Together) for a grant of £1,500. Sport England is already funding coached table tennis sessions on Saturday mornings and has agreed to fund coached football/fitness sessions through their Let's Get Moving Together Fund on Friday evenings from the 28th April. The funding

Evington is in the top 5!

Data obtained by Leicestershire Live, using a Freedom of Information request, shows that Evington ward is in the top 5 wards.

This sounds like good news on the surface. I smell a rat though. Evington is the Leicester ward with the 4th highest rat infestation. You may not have spotted one but they are with us, nonetheless.

There is an adage that one is never more than 6ft away from a rat. However, the arithmetic for working out the average distance to a rat is a bit rough and ready because rodents are not evenly spread. Added to that is the distinction between the streetwise urban rat and its country cousin the rural rat. Where does that leave suburban Evington poised just on the Eastern edge of the city? Surely, our rats live in gentle suburbia - hiding in the long grass, stealing quality seeds and wholemeal breadcrumbs from bird tables, and nosing around ever so inquisitively in our detritus. Evington provides ample greenery in which they can hide. They make their own nests and hiding holes from almost anything including ubiquitous plastic. They venture out to compete with foxes, squirrels and badgers for tasty morsels left by us. Overall, with an abundance of food and shelter, life for an Evington rat is quite cushy and that's the problem.

How can I deter those pesky pests?

We can help reduce the problem by not

scattering food for birds on the ground, and by always putting litter in a bin. Rinsing food containers before recycling also helps prevent rodents from being drawn to the smell of food. Sealing up tiny entry holes also deters them but remember if the rodent's head can poke through the whole body will surely follow. The rat has Houdini-like suppleness and flexibility and can limbo through the tiniest crack.

Pest Control

The city council runs a weekday pest control service and there is currently no charge for people who report a rat problem. No distinction of urban or suburban rats is made by the City Council which prefers to categorise (or should that be rategorise?) rats as either living indoors or outdoors.

The council aims to respond to reports of indoor rats within 48 hours where possible and 15 working days for rats outside the home. If you find that you have been inadvertently co-habiting with a rodent or several then don't hesitate to go to leicester.gov.uk and enter 'pest' in the search bar.

The Financial Cost

The Council spent a total of £165,970 in 2022 on dealing with rat problems and some of the worst affected areas were in Abbey , Belgrave, Rushey Mead. Evington

and North Evington.

The Risk to Health

Around the world, rats and mice are known to spread over 35 diseases that can infect both people and pets, including: plague. salmonellosis and leptospirosis.
