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
### **Editorial**

She worked at Leicester Royal Infirmary as a radiographer for a number of years before retiring as Superintendent Radiographer at Leicester General Hospital in 1983.

Sheila was active in both the Soroptimist International and Business and Professional Women's Leicester Associations and served as president of both organisations.

Until recently she was able to worship at St Denys and was active in the local community, especially with the village hall, becoming a trustee in 2004.

She was joined at the party by friends and family, the Vicar of St Denys, and a number of Evington residents.

Dear readers,

Now, after 43 days of strikes, we have won the dispute. UNISON members have voted overwhelmingly to accept a new,

significantly improved pay deal, which will be backdated to 2022. September settlement The includes the introduction of new pay scales and pay progression, which alongside the nationally-agreed 2022/23 salary increase of £1,925 pro-rata - brings support staff pay into line with Local

Support workers at Ash Field Academy win above inflation pay rise after 43 days of strikes!

After more than 40 days of industrial action, we the education support workers at Ash Field Academy have emerged victorious in our fight for fair pay.

The dispute began after we discovered evidence that our employer, Ash Field Academy Trust, had been paying many of us significantly less than equivalent staff in other special needs schools. After around 6 months of negotiations, our employer was still proposing to pay us less than other settings. We were therefore forced to undertake an industrial action ballot, which we won with a crushing majority. The dispute ended up going on for so long that we needed to conduct a second industrial action ballot in September, which again returned an extremely decisive vote for strikes on an increased turnout. Authority-maintained SEND schools. In addition, staff have secured a one-off payment of £2,000 to all support staff, and a contractual agreement to comply with all future nationally-agreed pay awards for school support staff.

We estimate that, excluding the £2,000 one off payment, the deal increases pay for classroom-based support staff (the lowest-paid employees involved in the dispute, who were most affected by the initial pay gap) by between 18 and 25 per cent.

This is a massive victory for all support staff at the school and the wider workers' movement. But like all investment in public services, it is not just the workers who will reap

the benefits. Our actions will help to rectify the recruitment and retention issues our school has faced and ultimately benefit us, our students and their families.

Quotes from members:

UNISON member and Teaching Assistant, Prabha Ramakrishnan, who is also a



parent of a child who attends the school, said:

"This victory was achieved only due to the majority of the support staff fighting together for their rights to fair pay supported by parents and pupils." Another UNISON member who wished to remain anonymous, said:

"This is a win not just for our members but the support staff across the board. Workers showed tremendous resolve and professionalism amidst prejudicial pressures to return to work but we stood firm."

A further Ash Field worker who also wished to remain anonymous said: "We won this dispute by sticking together, supporting each other and standing up for what we knew was right."

#### **GREEN ROOF**



In February 2019 Leicester City Council declared a climate emergency. Some of the initiatives since then might seem clearly expressed, like the electric hopper bus. But others, like planning decisions less so. Sometimes your own decisions are equally as important as and impactful, to our locality and for the wider ripples.

In 2011 I was looking to add space to my home. A shed seemed the most flexible sort of choice. However, the year before, the often boggy and wet garden had flooded, after a few days of heavy rain. I had also started to hear about the concept of heat spots. This is where little local islands are hotter than the rest of an area due to surfaces like roofs and tarmac emitting more heat than natural area.

By incorporating a living roof into my shed, water run off is slowed down and collected for plant watering. This helps manage the wet, cloggy, clay soil and lawn. As the base isn't concrete but crushed rubble there is also the option for some run off underneath. I've also learned a lot, about design, building structures and plants with shallow roots that can withstand extremes of temperature.

Concerned about the build up of heat spots in the city in the summer months; I hope that by adding a living roof this will not add to that problem, but might actually encourage others to use a similar solution. In 2020 Permaculture magazine published an article I wrote on why and how the shed was built. I'm hoping this will inspire others to include living roofs.

#### JOHN RUSSELL (1936 -2023)



What a man; what a

life. Last August family and friends gathered in Desford Free Church to celebrate the life of John Russell. John had lived and worked in Evington for decades, before moving with his wife Shirley to Desford to live closer

to elder son, Carey. The diversity of the gathering spoke volumes about the man and his interests. Moving tributes came from younger son Philip, Reverend Martin Mitchell and Eric Waweru.

#### Family Tribute

Philip, the younger son, described his father's life as "a tale of faith and service". John showed unflinching kindness and empathy to his fellow human beings. He shared a zany sense of humour with Trevor, his brother, and Philip recounted a particularly funny anecdote. The brothers shared a secret language that placed the syllable 'eg' in front of every vowel. One day a cheeky young Johnny used this secret code to make fun of a man wearing a ridiculously tall stovepipe hat. Imagine John's face when the gentleman retorted: "I have not heard that language since I was a child."

Growing up under the spectre of World War Two impacted John's outlook profoundly. Despite knowing about the potential cruelty of humanity he responded to hatred with love and he showed empathy where he saw suffering. Whether it was wartime or peacetime his Christian faith informed his humanity. John's missionary work led to lifelong



fellowships and his sons Philip and Carev recalled their Evington household being a welcoming hub for people from around the world. The lives of the family were enriched and it was an exemplary pastoral experience for the Russell boys.

#### **Church Tribute**

After the founding of Central Baptist church in 1983, John became a valuable member of the ministry team and a captivating and accomplished preacher. The Reverend Mitchell recalls that, in collaboration with the Leicester Twinning Association, John established а partnership with Strasbourg Baptist church. There followed several years of memorable exchange visits including to the European Parliament, to Strasbourg and across the Rhine into Germany to visit vinevards. The Reverend concluded with these words: "What a man .... what a life."

Centre Project Tribute Eric Waweru (Chief Executive of the Centre Project) first met John in 2002 and they started a welcome, support and befriending service for asylum seekers. John was a founding member and trustee of The Centre Project.

#### My Tribute

The Russells were my friends and neighbours in Evington and I considered John to be a mentor. We shared an interest in French language and culture and comparative religions. He wore his academic credentials lightly - despite holding a master's degree in theology.

I asked probing questions about faith but he was never phased, replying in simple relatable language. There was never any pressure to convert. Instead, he gently accompanied me as I drew closer to understanding his faith. John encouraged me to volunteer with The Centre Project

at a time when I was emotionally adrift. The anchor of service reorientated me to myself and to others. For John, selfless service was beneficial to those being served, but also therapeutic for those donating their time and efforts. At our last meeting, John was on fine form - chatty and animated with a mischievous twinkle in his eyes. It was remarkable as he had not long recovered from a bout of serious illness. For once, I let him do all the talking. Alas, that was our final meeting.

#### **CHILDREN'S CHRISTMAS CONCERT AND CELEBRATION OF 50 YEARS**

This Christmas, Willows Music Group, run by Daphne Wilshere, gave their first concert since Covid. It was held in St Denys church and celebrated Daphne's five decades of teaching the piano to children.

The group, which has been based in Evington for nearly all of these 50 years, nearly closed down during Covid, as many children did not want to work online, so this seemed a good time to retire. However, the invasion of Ukraine showed the possibility that things could become more difficult, especially with increasing prices, so teaching restarted on a smaller scale and online.

Having started teaching in the Scraptoft area, Daphne moved to Evington in 1974. The group has varied in size reaching a maximum of around 70 children and over the years more than 600 children have been members.

#### **ALEX PORTLOCK UPDATE**



Readers may recall Alex Portlock, a Franco-British journalist who was born in Leicester and is now living and working in France. As part of a journalism course in Montpellier, Alex was required to complete an internship with a media outlet. The Trustees of the Friends of Evington authorised the Echo's first community media internship. Alex wrote many articles and assisted with an exhibition of the Evington Echo to celebrate our 300th edition in February 2023, at the Documentary Media Centre, organised by John Coster.

We were delighted that Alex selected the Evington Echo to gain work experience as a community journalist. During Alex's exams in Montpellier last October, the jury was impressed with the quality of the work placement. Alex got in touch recently to provide a career update:

"One year after this enriching experience, I am in a small picturesque town called Uzès, in Southern France. My role is to share the latest news, to provide essential insights, and details of events in a weekly newspaper called 'Le Republicain d'Uzès'.

"With three other journalists, I cover this town of 10,000 inhabitants as well as the surrounding villages. It is a rural area where many inhabitants and organizations get involved to create a vibrant social and cultural lifestyle, with a particular focus on sustainable projects.

"The area of Uzège (Uzès and surrounding villages) attracts many anglophones. In fact, during my reports, I had numerous occasions to speak English because a couple of my interviewees were British or American. For example, my first report was on a local associative station called Fuze. Though it is mostly in French, they do have an English section. I met Nicola Clouter, a lady from Reading, living in Uzès, who is very involved in Fuze. She presents the local agenda to English-speaking folk.

"I am also a volunteer at this radio station. In January 2024 I am launching a regular show called 'English corner in Uzège'. I write and lead radio bulletins for French locals interested in anything linked to Britain or the English language. My first one will be on language tips."

I was interviewed for ITV News for a report about the current 'unsuitable for purpose' health checks for new born babies and the need to reform existing checks.

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

#### A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE EVINGTON HOUSE ESTATE

Evington House became a retirement home for Colonel John Dick Burnaby, (Colonel Burnaby), his wife and two unmarried daughters in 1836.

Colonel Burnaby was a younger son of the Burnaby family of Baggrave Hall at Hungarton in Leicestershire. The family came originally from Asfordby. Colonel Burnaby was born in 1776 at Greenwich in Kent where his father was the vicar. His father, the Revd. Andrew Burnaby, was noted for having travelled across Canada as a young man sending home reports on the 'British Territories'; a demanding journey in those days. Like many younger sons, Colonel Burnaby had to make his own way in the world and he joined the 1st Foot Guards, (later to become the Grenadiers) as an Ensign at the age of 16. The Army lists reveal his steady promotion until he reached the rank of Lieutenant Colonel but I, (M. Hewson), have been unable to discover anything else about his

military career, despite having scanned the musters of camps in the Peninsular War, in which the regiment fought. He was rumoured to have been at the Battle of Waterloo, but a list of all the officers present at the battle, published in 1919, has no mention of him. In 1789, Colonel Burnaby married Miss Henry Anne Fowke of Lowesby Hall, Leics. and they had 11 children. Their eldest son, another John, was well known as a Recorder (judge) in the Leicester area.

Colonel Burnaby died in 1852 and after the death of his wife, his daughters Miss Ann and Miss Henry installed the large memorial window in the chancel of St. Denys Church with two small windows commemorating their own lives. Miss Henry and Miss Ann lived on until the 1880s taking an interest in the life of the village and donating a harmonium to the village school. Every Summer they would entertain the school children to a 'tea drinking' in the grounds of Evington House. In 1997, a dog's gravestone was discovered in the park. Unfortunately, the top is chipped but the memorial poem is carefully composed and refers to the owner as 'she' so it may well have been in memory of a Burnaby pet. An interesting fact is that Colonel Burnaby's brother is an ancestor of Queen Elizabeth II. In 1859 his grandaughter, Caroline married the Revd. C. Cavendish Bentinck and their daughter Celia, later the Countess of Strathmore, was the mother of Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother. Evington House was then


owned or let for short periods by a succession of families. In the 1914-18 War it was used as an auxiliary hospital (Voluntary Aided Detachment Hospital) and the small room above the porch was possibly an operating theatre. In 1931, it was bought by Mr. Tom Trevor Sawday, an architect and the son-in-law of Arthur Wakerley, who developed much of North Evington, naming the streets after his wife and daughters, Dorothy, Constance and Margaret. At that time Evington was truly a separate village with a genuinely rural way of life. Leicester ended where Mayflower Church now stands. In 1989, Mr. Hugh Sawday, Tom Trevor Sawday's son, loaned the photographs which have been displayed in the entrance hall and show the house, grounds and village in the 1930s.

During the Second World War, Evington House was the headquarters of the Home Guard Platoon with Mr. Sawday as second-in-command. In 1947, the house and estate of nearly 40 acres were bought by Leicester Corporation for £17,000. It was formally opened as a public park by Councillor Hill in 1948.

Unfortunately, much of the character of Evington House, used as offices and a training centre, has not been preserved, but the grouping of the trees, some planted in pairs, and the secluded setting, give the feel of a private estate. There is a fine mulberry tree in the garden for the disabled at the back of the house.







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#### RICHARD ERNEST GAYS (DICK GAYS) 23RD MAY 1935 – AUGUST 2013

An obituary to Dick was written by Brian Golland, who was his best friend and a senior police officer and a Group Scout leader of the 19th Leicester (Evington) Scout Group.

Dick was born in Evington and went to the local village school with Michael Dally. Michael saved this obituary to a remarkable Evington born and bred engineer.

Although he was very clever and could have achieved an academic life, practical work was what Dick preferred and after leaving school he became an engineering apprentice where he learned the skills that would stay with him all his life.

He became a member of the Leicester and Midland canoe clubs and was a founder of the Leicestershire Association of Canoeists. In those days, canoes were either made of wood or wood and canvas and Dick was more than capable of building his own canoe. His method of manufacture was called 'Dickwood'. He not only built canoes, but collapsible ones that could be taken on a train. He met his wife Margaret through a canoeing friend. She wasn't too impressed with Dick's trick of holding his breath and hanging upside down below his canoe until everyone was fearful that he was drowning. "Showing off" she said, but nevertheless the relationship blossomed and they married and had two children, Ian and Mary.

Dick did National Service with the RAF as an aircraft engineer and spent most of his national service canoeing. He turned his hand to making fibre glass canoes and designed and made the 'Swift' canoes and commissioned Soar Valley Product to make them under licence.



After National Service, Dick joined the police force and met Brian.

Dick was more than capable of reaching a high rank. However he had no interest in progressing. He was more interested in his love of the outdoors, but now no longer just canoes. He met someone who parachuted. To further this new hobby, Dick sold the right to his canoes for the



price he needed to buy his first parachute. He started to make rip cords and handles that were better and cheaper than anyone else's.. In fact the parachute manufacturer bought them from him. He became a parachute instructor. And you guessed it, he made his own parachute and jumped in it. Apart from one other parachute manufacturer called Irvine, Dick was the only person in this country to have ever made and jumped from his own parachute. He started to make para-



shapes. (See pictures above).





During this time, Dick and Brian parachuted and walked together and with the walking they gradually developed a more fixed team and walked everywhere – Derbyshire (mainly) but Wales, Ireland, the Lake District, North York Moors, the Outer Hebrides and the Scilly Isles. Dick prepared the routes, he must have done hundreds and everything was planned to the last detail.

Then Dick found out about REMAP, a charitable organisation of scientists and engineers who make equipment, gadgets and aids to improve the life of disabled people, enabling them to live more independent lives. Dick loved designing and making equipment in his workshop and made 82 different gadgets. Towards the end of his life his two main interests were walking and REMAP. Dick did a lot of work to get REMAP better known. He is sadly missed by them. He was many people's hero.
