New Nordic Walking Opportunities in Evington



Some of you, over the past eight years, may have seen people walking in and around Evington using long poles and wondered what are they doing? The answer is ... Nordic walking. A sport that originated in Finland in the late 1990s and has since

gone global as a way to exercise more than 90% of the body but is gentle on joints and has the calorific expenditure equivalent to jogging. If you have seen the Wednesday morning Evington group, you will have noticed that people are chatting away and smiling as it is also a very pleasant way to exercise too.

The Ministry of Nordic Walks Community Group, that provides low cost opportunities in and around Leicester and

Leicestershire to take part in Nordic walking, is about to launch a new initiative in Evington, introducing this activity to even more people, with 30-minute beginner lessons at Sedgebrook Open Space on Wednesday lunchtimes 12 - 12:30 pm and 12:45 - 1:15 pm. The special poles will be provided so all you will need are some waterproof walking shoes/boots as lessons will take place on grass. Sessions will cost £3 and are open to anyone age 18 and over.

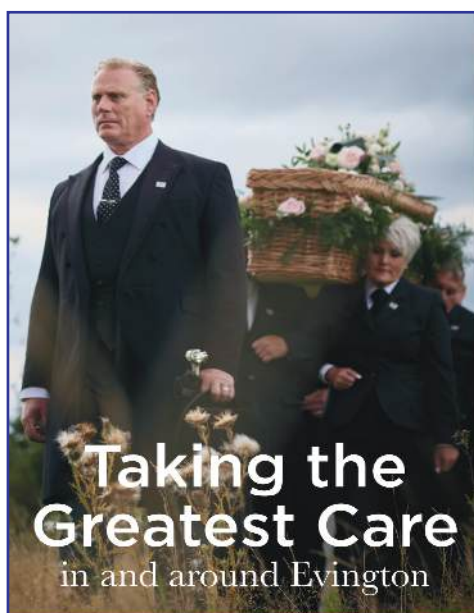

A CELEBRATION OF PAUL HENRY ARCHDEACON

28.7.1960 – 6.8.2024



Paul Archdeacon was known to many of us. Either through family, teaching or community projects, he was loved and respected by so many. This was reflected by the astonishing number of people attending his funeral service. Here are a few memories shared by those who knew him well.

Born in Manchester, he was the second of five children born to Harry and Celia Archdeacon. As a child he liked Airfix models: boats, planes and even a model of King Henry VIII. He would call them 'artefacts' and give them titles as if they were archaeological treasures. At 15, he designed and built a whole wall of fitted bedroom furniture for his sisters – leaving his mother in awe! He was interested in 'fixing' things – or at least trying to – taking things to bits to see how they worked. He customised an old bike with 'cool' wing mirrors and all sorts of accessories but was not protective about it; lending it freely to his sister to give her well-needed freedom. He also jazzed up her first car (bought for £100!) with fancy seat covers and 'g-faster' stripes – it didn't, and was subsequently nick-named 'Slug'. The hours spent on it were an early example of his generosity of spirit.

Despite being brought up with classical music, Paul developed a wide-ranging, eclectic taste from dreamy Albinoni; furious film scores like 2001: A Space Odyssey; Irish music such as the Furies; and his real passion – Pink Floyd, with its powerful music and lyrics.

Paul originally wanted to be a chef – it would have really suited him as his Sunday lunches were legendary! His father had other ideas and he was enrolled onto a degree course at Salford University to study Arts and Social Sciences. On

graduation, he completed teacher training and moved to Canada. There he took up the challenge of volunteering with the Frontier Apostolate, working with First Nation people (then called Indians). He began his teaching career in Prince George, British Columbia, where he was a very popular teacher with a particular interest in photography. He really enjoyed the outdoor life in Canada, skiing, mountain climbing and hitch-hiking with his new, but now life-long, friend Gerry. In BC he also met his first wife, Carmel.

Moving to Ireland, Paul completed his MA thesis on cast iron in Georgian Architecture. Ireland was a great place to study cast iron as it was found everywhere; from foot scrapers to fire surrounds to manhole covers. They lived in a big old house with orchards in Wexford where he developed a passion for making jam. Later they moved to London, Paul taught in Ealing, he and Carmel married, and his first son Brendan was born. The couple eventually moved to Leicester, where Paul began class teaching, then he became a language support teacher at Spinney Hill Primary, later he moved to Uplands in 1994 where he remained up to retirement in 2015. He still continued in education, marking and trialling questions for SATs papers, invigilating exams and volunteering as a governor at Bridge and Green Lane Infant Schools. He was dedicated to ensuring that every child was given the opportunity and support to achieve their best and fought against any cutbacks particularly in the arts and music. He loved going into schools and engaging with children in any way he could, including playing a very smartly-dressed Santa!

In 1994, Paul married Lesley; their sons Lewis and Elliott were born in 2000 and 2005. He was devoted to his family; He adored his three sons and was very proud of their achievements. One of the last trips he made was a holiday with Lesley and the boys. He was determined to enjoy this time together, regardless of how he was feeling. Due to his progressing illness, he didn't get to kayak or zip-wire with them but was delighted to hear about their fun.

Paul got involved in many community projects, from preparing an allotment for Mayflower School, digging a massive community pond at Hilltop Allotments. Loving the outdoors, this spurred him on to get his own allotment. He succeeded in growing fantastic vegetables which would be proudly served up for Sunday lunch. He

loved chatting to people there about his super-fast generating composter and his weather station, his 'brick museum' and all his other passions.

He was very creative, always using recycled materials; no skip was left unchecked! His 'designs' were always a bit 'Heath Robinson' – with odd quirks and twists and turns. "But it works!" was always his answer. Many tools were purchased, many 'near-misses' and numerous casual phone calls from A&E saying "Don't worry Lesley but ..." He was an active member of Friends of Evington, delivering the Echo and working on planting and maintaining areas in the local community to enhance the area for all.

Paul was brave and fought his illness with dignity, never complaining about how he was feeling throughout his treatments and surgeries.

This calm laid-back gentleman was committed. He had a very dry but infectious sense of humour, it's impossible to think of him without a smile.

Thank you Paul. Your commitments, drive and energy are an example to us all.

RUTH POLLINGTON (NEÉ ROWELL) SEPTEMBER 1949 – JUNE 2024



Born in Rochdale, Ruth lived there until the family moved to Evington in 1957 when her father accepted the invitation to take up the pastorate at Evington Chapel. She was to live in Evington for the rest of her life.

School years were spent at Whitehall and Spencefield, before moving on to Newarke Girls for the sixth form. Her teenage years were beset with a weak heart and a developing scoliosis, treatment for which included many months in a 'Milwaukee brace'. Her perseverance was an example to others and the school report for 1966 includes the statement 'Prize for cheerfulness and determination'.

Brought up with a strong respect for the Bible, she began to think seriously about life and death in her late teens when she faced open heart surgery to correct a birth defect. The operation was undertaken at the Groby Road Hospital, in the very early days of such procedures, and there was no guarantee of survival. In the light of this she grappled with the question as to where would she be if things didn't go as planned. Would she be with Jesus? She recognised that more than a family connection was needed and came to possess a strong personal faith in Jesus as her Lord and Saviour. With this faith she went into theatre rejoicing in the Bible verse, 'The LORD is good, a strong hold in the day of trouble; and he knows them that trust in him.' The operation was a success and she subsequently joined the church at Evington where she took her turn in playing the historic organ and held the post of treasurer for 45 years.

Leaving school she began work as a technician in the Geography department of the University. There she was trained to become a cartographer eventually gaining recognition at a national level winning a prestigious cartographic award twice - a feat that was acknowledged by the then vice chancellor. A sample of the quality of the work that won one of these awards can still be appreciated on the Evington Chapel website, where the 'How to Get to' map is based on the work submitted for the award (<https://www.evingtonchapel.org.uk/howtoev.pdf>). Her colleagues described her as both conscientious and meticulous. For nearly 40 years she drew maps and diagrams for the academic staff, first with pen and ink and later using the 'new fangled' computing technology. Her love of maps converted into an interest in relating the places that she could see on paper, into seeing them for real. Trips abroad included Norway, Israel, Jordan, and Canada. Many happy holidays were spent exploring the mountains and lochs of north west Scotland and the west coast of Ireland.

After a short illness Ruth departed this life on 16th June 2024 and is survived by her husband Andrew to whom she was married for 37 years.
